You already know a good deal about what you like and don't like, but you will discover more. Chances are, some of those interests are or will become passions. What role will they play in your chosen life?

4 **Be creative?**

Creativity is required in every academic discipline. You'll draw ideas and insights from all kinds of sources. But how will you shape those influences into your own innovative thought and action?

5 **Respect others?**

Civility is a cornerstone of our community, and we celebrate the diversity of individuals, even when we don't agree with their ideas or actions. But it's not just about others; it's also about your future. Seeing things from another person's point of view can be difficult, but that ability will be important for your success in every aspect of your life.
